## **Course Description**

The New Testament exhorts Christ's followers: "Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another" (Hebrews 10:24-25).

More forcefully, St. Cyprian (210-258 CE), a bishop in the early church, famously said "outside the church there is no salvation." Similarly, the Protestant reformer John Calvin wrote, "No one can have God as their Father without having the Church as their Mother." Though these statements might seem extreme to us today, they reflect an important biblical conviction:

The church is central to God's plan and mission of redeeming and saving the world! (Ephesians 1:9-10, 22-23)

But what is the church? Why does it exist? What things should it be doing and in what priority? What form(s) might it take? How should it be governed and led? How is the church related to God's mission? Should the church be focused primarily on believers or unbelievers? Should it focus on 'holiness' or 'inclusiveness'? 'Spirituality' or 'social justice'?

In this mini-course, we will explore how the *nature* of the church (what the church *IS*, according to Scripture) should shape, inform, and motivate our *expressions* of church. What the church *does* should flow authentically from what (and who) the church *is*. In light of this, we will discuss implications for holistic Christian life together in community, worship, ministry, spiritual formation, and mission.
